** Cavity Free Kids Oral Health Curriculum for Infants/Toddlers, Preschoolers, and Their Families: Train-the-Trainer **

Lisa Bell RDH, MPH, State Public Health Dental Hygienist Department of Health, Division of Public Health The Cavity Free Kids curriculum was designed by the Washington Dental Service Foundation specifically for use in Head Start/Early Head Start programs. The curriculum presents oral health as an ongoing part of preschool education and includes components devoted to classroom activities, infant and toddler programs, and parent education materials for use in parent meetings or home visits to impact the oral health of the entire family. The Cavity Free Kids oral health concepts are aligned with the primary domains of the Head Start Child Outcomes Framework.

Participants in this train-the-trainer session will learn the five essential learning concepts that organize the curriculum for children and family components. The

classroom curriculum is presented in five units where each unit is devoted to one of the five essential learning concepts. Each unit is divided into three to six lessons and each lesson includes: a teacher-directed group activity, hands-on learning activities, parent connection reminders, and materials for parents and teachers. The family curriculum consists of a "Home Visitor Tooth Kit" and other materials for program staff to use when making home visits and conducting parent meetings. In addition to relaying information related to what children are learning in the classroom, the family curriculum also includes a special section concerning the oral health of infants and toddlers. Improving Child Nutrition through Home **Visitation with Head Start Families**

Overweight and obesity are increasing problems in preschool children with poor diet and limited physical activity laying the foundation for serious health risks later in life. In Wisconsin, 25% of low-income children between the ages of two and four are either overweight or at risk of being overweight. Research has established

a relationship between diets that are rich in fruit and vegetable consumption and reduced risk of chronic diseases (including cardiovascular disease, hypertension, diabetes, and certain types of cancer). Door County UW-Extension partnered with Head Start in Sturgeon Bay to deliver a unique, comprehensive program to low-income families which includes classroom instruction, family nights, educational programs, family events, and home visitation. Using a pre- and post-test experimental design, researchers found the home visitation component made a significant difference in outcomes between control and experimental groups.

Participants will gain an understanding of the components of the program design; understand outcomes achieved by the program; and explore potential community partners/funding sources and ways to replicate the program locally. Additionally, participants will identify program components that may be of benefit in their local Head Start programs and develop an implementation plan.

Preschool Bullying: What Teachers and Administrators Need to Know

Trena Loomans, Social Service/Mental Health Specialist Marathon County Child Development Agency Head Start We tend to hear a lot about bullying behaviors in middle and high school. However, when bullying behaviors are mentioned in preschool many raise an eyebrow to the notion. There is growing research that consistently demonstrates intentional bullying behavior does, in fact, starts as early as preschool. The difficulty comes in identifying the difference between developmental reactive aggression and the conscious choice to use aggression to attain power or control. This presentation differentiates between the two and

gives specific behaviors to look for in identifying bullying from healthy play. We'll consider the possible causes of bullying behavior and what we can do to prevent it in the education field. Another concern we'll tackle is how to help the victim of bullying become empowered. We will also a look at policy and procedure to address this concern. We use the label "bully" but in reality there is always a purpose behind behavior. The bully is telling us something about themselves and if we address that need before missing the developmental milestone of social and emotional development, we can have a significant impact on society as a whole.
