Act Early Wisconsin: Resources to Support Early Identification of Autism and Other Developmental Concerns

Opening Doors / Abriendo Puertas

With the growing population of Latino children in our school systems, it is important to reach our families early and get them involved in their child's education. The Abriendo Puertas program is based on the premise that enhancing parenting skills early in a child's life leads to economic and societal benefits. The curriculum is centered on the cultural values, strengths, and experiences of Latino families and uses popular education and folk wisdom. This approach engages parents at a very personal level and results in transformative learning. Although it is centered around Latino families, it is appropriate for use with any and all families. Through the two-day training, facilitators will learn about the unique features of the Abriendo Puertas curriculum, including the following: *Overview of the 10 sessions, which cover the important aspects of child and family well-being: good health, social and emotional wellbeing, school readiness, and the economic well-being of the family. *An understanding of the cultural and linguistic relevance of the Abriendo Puertas curriculum, including its use of "dichos" or popular sayings, activities such as the Loteria game and how to create a safe environment for parent reflection. *Popular education techniques and ideas for parent outreach and ways to engage local partners. Upon completion of this "Train the Facilitator" training, the participants will be able to facilitate parent group sessions with the families within their program as well as train others to facilitate.
