Introduction to the Pre-K CLASS Framework

Participants will understand background information on what the CLASS tool measures and its structure. During the two days (four hours each day), participants will complete activities to strengthen their understanding of each domain and practice CLASS observation skills. After viewing video exemplars, participants will have opportunities for group discussion on coding to deepen their knowledge of scoring through a CLASS lens.

Motivational Interviewing: A Framework for Engaging Those You Serve in Positive Changes

Change is hard. Those who strive to help others make changes for themselves and their families often find it challenging to find and maintain the motivation for change. It can feel like we are doing all the work, our priorities aren't aligned, and goals are set but never achieved. Motivational Interviewing offers an evidence-based model for effective conversations about change. In this session we will explore the foundational spirit of this approach and learn and practice the skills and techniques. Our time together will be highly participatory and will give participants an opportunity to observe and practice the skills, practical strategies, and tools in real-play and role-play situations.

Learning Outcomes:

After attending this session, participants will be better able to:

- Identify the four key domains of the spirit of MI
- Employ the core skills in MI at a basic level
- Integrate MI spirit and skills into current approach with the people they serve
- Design a plan for future development towards proficiency in MI

Using Reflective Practice to Support Your Coaching Model

Reflective supervision is a collaborative relationship for professional growth that improves program quality and strengthens practice. Reflective practice builds the capacity of individuals, relationships, and organizations by cherishing strengths and partnering around vulnerabilities (Zero to Three). This session will explore the three building blocks of reflective supervision—reflection, collaboration, and regularity. Participants will gain knowledge and skills to implement reflective practice in their everyday activities on an individual level and in collaborative relationships within their program. Participants will explore strategies for improving self and shared reflections. They will gain knowledge on how to integrate these skills during supervision and how to resolve the common challenges that arise.

During the first day participants will explore different models of reflective practice and how to use reflective practice for professional development. During the second day participants will explore more in-depth use of reflective practice to support coaching within a program. By utilizing Practice Base coaching, a cyclical process for supporting teachers' use of effective teaching practices; participants will explore the different components of planning goals and action steps, engaging in focused observation, and reflecting on and sharing feedback about teaching practice to implement and sustain an effective coaching system. Through interactive discussions and activities, participants will gain practical approaches for developing a shared understanding of reflective supervision and early childhood coaching.

She has worked as an infant/toddler teacher, a developmental screener and program manager for an Early Head Start program. Most recently, the past 6 years she has provided training and technical assistance to HS/EHS programs. 
- The value that healthy relationships have on one's sense of belonging, knowing they matter, and belief they are accepted and appreciated.




